"Our aim is to empower learners with the knowledge, skills and personal qualities they need to be future-ready young people. By offering as wide a range of literature and writers as possible, we want our learners to understand the power of language to change the world they live in."

English Intent

We want our learners to understand and validate their place in the modern world through the study of literature and non-fiction to address gaps and expand their cultural capital. We aim to expose our learners to as wide a range of literary voices as possible, particularly from under-represented and marginalised groups. Literature can offer a window into the lives of others; we want learners to explore these lives to enrich their own. We choose novels, plays, poetry, non-fiction and 19th century texts that are at a standard of excellence making them worthy of study, whilst being appropriate to learners' reading and interest levels. By studying world class novels we allow our learners to engage with contemporary issues such as prejudice, conflict and political unrest, whilst also developing their personal qualities of empathy, confidence, integrity and kindness. Through a consistent approach to reading, we allow students to explore the power of language and structure in a formal, academic manner. Mastery of writing is essential to success in future life; we insist our students write at length and with use of Tier 2/3 vocabulary, both in lessons and at home, to give them the mature, articulate voice needed to be confident communicators. Opportunities for learners to write creatively and express themselves orally are offered throughout the curriculum. By the end of Key Stage 3, learners should be academically and personally ready for GCSE at Key Stage 4.
