


Before the winter break, some year 9 DT students were working hard on their entries for the national V&A innovate competition.

The competition is open to all comprehensive school students in years 7, 8 and 9. This year the V&A received 226 entries, all of which were looked at by a panel of judges, with just 10 teams being chosen to present their ideas in London. Unfortunately we did not make the finals this year, but the judges have given our students some great feedback and certificates will be sent out and passed on to all who entered the competition.

Aleyen School Shoe

Great to see initial ideas and identified the issue of material waste. Fantastic research of different materials and clear evidence of the development of the shoe. Drawings that showed details of each part outlining the specific materials and functionality, including exploring the pros and cons. Some evidence of user research but unclear where this feedback has come from. Given explanations to why they have chosen certain materials, taking into consideration practicalities. They've iterated nicely from their initial design to a scale model. The group have clearly taken into account the environmental impact of material waste.

This team have identified the pressing issue of pollution and material waste. Great to see the research into materials. They have considered the environmental impact through thinking about environmentally friendly materials. They have shown good model making experimenting with different materials.



Patchwork All-Season Shoe

The team showed good research skills in looking into the amount and type of materials used in manufacturing a shoe, and how this is not environmentally-friendly. The team could have supported the relevance of their shoe idea by undertaking some primary research with key users - fellow students - and seeing what they and their families value in a school shoe. There are some great considerations regarding the multiple use of the shoe across seasons. The group focused on the design of the shoe with some good sketches showing the developments and made a model. They could have enhanced their research and design process by sharing different iterations with others and getting feedback to respond to. Well done to the team for a strong idea.


Approximately 40 different materials

They could have enhanced their research and design process by sharing different iterations with others and getting feedback to respond to, as well as doing some research into the types of materials that are sustainable and could be used in the design of their shoe, and what characteristics they have. Sustainable Footwear



For our project, we are designing trainers made from recycled materials.



QUEENS' COLLEGE—CAMBRIDGE

This half term we were visited by the Schools Liaison Officer for Bradford at Queens' College, University of Cambridge. They are especially keen to work with students from backgrounds which are currently underrepresented in Higher Education (FSM/ Ever6, care experienced, refugee and asylum seeker, young carers, Black, British Pakistani and British Bangladeshi pupils).

STUDENT LOCKERS FOR YEAR 11


We would like to offer students the opportunity of having a locker in school for use for the remainder of year 11 and throughout the exam season.


